

Carroll County Youth Service Bureau is an outpatient behavioral health clinic providing mental health and substance use services. We are licensed by the Maryland Department of Health (MDH), accredited by the Commission on the

Accreditation for Rehabilitative Facilities (CARF) and



certified by the Department of Juvenile Services (DJS). Carroll County Youth Service Bureau has provided outpatient services in Carroll County since 1972 and has grown into a multi-disciplinary behavioral health practice that offers a continuum of outpatient treatment options. Therapists utilize a family-systems approach that incorporates the child, adult, and family within their community and recognizes and values their impact on one another. This approach reinforces individual and

family strengths, addresses identified needs, and utilizes community resources.

Outpatient Behavioral Health Clinic: Mental Health and Substance Use Services for Children, Adolescents & Adults

Services include assessment, individual, family and group therapy, psychiatric evaluations, medication management, psychosocial evaluations, and liaison with school and local service agencies. CCYSB's programs and services provide a full-range of treatment options to meet the needs of individuals and families experiencing the negative impact of mental health and addiction concerns.

Psychiatric Services

CCYSB offers psychiatric services to clients who receive psychotherapy services within the Clinic, Family Preservation, and the Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) program. These medical services are provided by licensed psychiatrists and psychiatric nurse practitioners.



Connecting Youth in Carroll County (CY)

This program serves youth ages 16-24 who are not in school, not

employed, and who may be homeless. CCYSB, along with Human Services Programs (HSP) and the Carroll County Workforce Development (formerly BERC) partner to provide a coordinated county-wide approach to re-engage these youth and reduce youth homelessness.

Elementary School Intervention Program

CCYSB provides services to elementary students who are struggling with challenging emotions and behavior. They may have significant mental health concerns or difficult family situations which impact their school experience, and their behavior. Previous efforts to support parents or guardians in addressing the child's needs may not have been successful.

Family Engagement Program (FEP)

CCYSB, in partnership with the Carroll County Department of Juvenile Services (DJS) and Carroll County Local Management Board (LMB), provides behavioral health case management services for youth and their families at risk of involvement within Maryland's Department of Juvenile Services. FEP staff assesses the youth and family's needs and facilitates linkages to services in the community, with the purpose of diverting these youth from involvement, or further involvement within DJS.

Family Preservation and Safe & Stable Programs (FP)

The Family Preservation (FP) and Safe & Stable Family Preservation programs are short-term, home-based programs that provide therapies designed to preserve and improve family relationships and prevent out-of-home placement for children. Goals of the programs include prevention of children from entering into foster care, successful transition of children returning home from foster care, and in some cases, the coordinated move of children into secure, permanent family settings.

Interactive Group Therapy

We offer several Group Therapy options for both adolescents and adults. Group Therapy helps clients manage depression, anxiety, anger, substance use issues and more in a supportive, nonjudgmental, peer and therapist-based environment. While Group Therapy can seem overwhelming and anxiety provoking, studies have shown its effectiveness in helping people find the feedback and support they need to make changes and improve their lives. Our group members often share "it's kind of scary at first, but then it's really nice to be with people who understand and are there to help me. We get something out of helping each other too."

Graduate and Undergraduate Intern Training Program

This program provides intensive training, supervision, and on-the-job experience to master's-level clinical interns and undergraduate students. Interns come from the University of Maryland School of Social Work, Towson University, McDaniel College, Hood College, University of Pennsylvania, Morgan State University, Johns Hopkins University, and several on-line university programs.

Open Access Walk-In Assessment Program

Our agency is pleased to offer expanded Open Access Services. This program provides time for same-day or next-day walk-in mental health and substance use assessments with a licensed therapist, with clinical recommendations. Provided availability, treatment options will be offered, or we will assist in finding you the appropriate level of care.

Mobile Treatment Programs

Our Mobile Treatment Team utilizes a service-delivery model that provides comprehensive recovery-oriented treatment to people with severe and persistent mental illnesses. The team's primary functions are to provide treatment, case management, substance use, vocational, and support services to individuals to assist them in successful community living.

Suicide/Self-Injury Intervention and Violence Assessment Programs

During school hours, an on-call therapist provides a clinical assessment for Carroll County Public School students at risk of suicide or selfharm. The Violence Assessment Program provides assessment for students following a suspension for serious threats or acts of violence.



Evidence-Based Interventions Improves Outcomes

The use of evidence-based interventions aligns with our vision to be the foremost mental health provider for youth, adults and families in Carroll County by providing innovative, culturally sensitive, and highly-effective treatment.

CCYSB's five treatments which are evidence-based models requiring fidelity to the model are:

• Assertive Community Treatment (ACT)

The Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) program is a critical service for treating individuals who have the most serious and persistent mental health concerns. The ACT team staff are experienced in psychiatry, nursing, counseling, and substance use treatment. In addition to therapeutic and medical concerns, the team often addresses issues of everyday life: food, budgeting, housing and employment concerns. ACT team members work with clients in their homes, neighborhoods, and community locations; providing crisis management 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

• Brief Strategic Family Therapy (BSFT)

This program is a short-term, problem-focused, evidence-based model which serves youth 6-18 years-old and involves the entire family in the counseling process. BSFT serves children with conduct problems, problematic family relationships, substance use, delinquency, aggressive & violent behavior, risky sexual behavior, and anti-social peer involvement. BSFT focuses on problematic interactions within the family, replacing them with healthier interactions.

• **Child-Parent Psychotherapy (CPP)** This treatment model serves young children from birth through age five and their parents/caregivers. One of the main goals of Child-Parent Psychotherapy is to support and strengthen the parent-child relationship as this relationship is central to the child's healing, development, and well-being.

• Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT)

Dialectical Behavior Therapy is an evidence-based, cognitive behavioral treatment originally developed to treat chronic suicidal ideation, self-harm behaviors and traits of borderline personality disorder. The treatment model has proven effective in treating other complex, and challenging disorders such as substance dependence, depression, and post-traumatic stress disorder [PTSD].

• Parent Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT)

This program is an empirically supported treatment for young children (ages 1-7) with disruptive behaviors. PCIT integrates concepts from social learning theory, traditional play therapy, and attachment theory to enhance the parent-child relationship, increase children's pro-social behaviors, and increase the parent's behavior-management skills.

Achieving this accreditation involved an internal examination of both our program and business practices. Providers must sufficiently demonstrate its conformance to the standards in order to earn CARF accreditation.



Notes: Open Access program expansion began on 9/6/22, thus accounting for the increase in Family/ Self/Friend Referrals.

Category changes from FY22: Community/ Primary Care Physicians is now called Primary Care and includes any referrals that came from primary care physicians or pediatricians.

Social Agencies is now called Community/Social Agencies and includes any referrals from an agency that provides outpatient behavioral health services such as intra-agency, Access Carroll, Potomac Case Management, etc.

Hospitals is now called Hospitals/Inpatient/ Residential Treatment and includes any behavioral health treatment in a non-outpatient, non-community based setting.






The FY2023 independent audit was completed as of June 2023, and reported total revenues and support of \$6,666,158 for a 24.2% increase from FY2022. The increase was due to a significant pledge for a new building addition 10.6%, an increase in State and Local agency fundings 5.4% and an increase in Client Fees 3.8%. Client Fees continue to outpace all other revenue sources at 44.9% of total revenues with State and Local agency fundings at 23.8%.

The FY2023 audit reported total expenditures of \$6,055,583, reflecting an 8.8% increase from FY2022. Client & Program services made up 5.9% of the expense increase and was directly related to the increased funding received for the services. Client/ Program Services are 85.6% of the total agency expenses followed by Management and General expenses at 10.9%. The most significant expenses for Client & Program Services were salaries, related payroll taxes and employee benefits making up 84% of all expenses within this category .






NUMBER OF SESSIONS IN FY2023

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The new addition will:

- Expand group therapy, counseling, and psychiatric services for clients with a goal of providing services for an additional 500 individuals (20% increase) within two years of the addition.
- House our new Mobile Treatment Program... allowing nurses, therapists, and mental health counselors to serve a population with more serious needs, including those individuals who are unable to leave their home. This strategy has measurable impact on reducing homelessness, emergency room visits, and instilling a sense of individual responsibility.
- Address the needs of the Assertive Community Treatment team, which serves people with severe and chronic mental health needs. An increased and more adequate office space in the addition will allow for enhanced program services to more readily address basic needs and enhance life skills. These include laundry facilities, a teaching kitchen, and an employment center.
- Provide general meeting space to increase group therapies, hold staff and board meetings, and deliver continuing education to our community.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT: OPEN ACCESS WALK-IN ASSESSMENTS

At the corner of readiness and accessibility.

Carroll County Youth Service Bureau provides integrated and evidence-based treatment approaches for youth, adults, adolescents, and families experiencing mental health and/or substance use issues.

Our Walk-In service provides a same-day/ next-day, comprehensive behavioral health assessment with a licensed therapist, and recommendations within three days. Provided availability, treatment options will be offered, or we will assist in finding you the appropriate level of care.

Services through our Open Access program include providing both scheduled and same



day/next day, walk in diagnostic assessments as well as clinical recommendations for each client assessed based on their diagnoses, level of care needed, and type of therapeutic program and modality that best fits their clinical needs. Same/next week psychiatric services are available to clients who are connected to mental health or substance use services within CCYSB.

The need for mental/behavioral services has only been exacerbated by the pandemic; as a result, the wait for services at CCYSB and across the county has been persistent. This program aims to combat our agency's waitlist so that as many people as possible who are seeking help can receive it in a timely manner. Additional goals are to continue offering multiple assessment slots per week; continue to find ways to provide high-quality treatment to as many people in need as possible; expand use of telehealth assessments as an option to increase accessibility as well as to refine the workflow for this process; utilize newly created electronic paperwork with clients to improve the assessment experience; and continue to explore needed areas of improvement for staff training.

50th Anniversary Celebration

On September 16th, 2021 from 4 to 6pm, Carroll County Youth Service Bureau held our 50th anniversary of providing outpatient mental health treatment to the Carroll County community.

About 75 former and current employees along with members of the community, including donors, attended the event at our facility on Kate Wagner Road to mark the occasion. Andie Luchini, our organization's Director of Development, Marketing, Events and Community Outreach, noted that this was an "incredibly



important" event, explaining that it was the first time since before the COVID-19 pandemic that the agency could get together as a group. "It was really great to see people. It was the first gathering outside of our agency, that we could get together and celebrate with everyone."

During the evening, our nonprofit announced that it had commissioned a feasibility study on a planned 10 thousand square-foot facility expansion. The expansion will allow our nonprofit to continue what it has been doing for 50 years — providing mental health, suicide and substance use services for children, adolescents, adults and families in Carroll County. The event also included proclamations from both state and county officials to commemorate the organization's 50th anniversary.

Carroll County Commissioner Ed Rothstein, who represents District 5, read a proclamation to the audience and praised the nonprofit's leadership. Rothstein said the Bureau is a "wonderful organization and an integral part" of the county's approach to taking care of its citizens. He said county officials are committed to help identify the nonprofit's needs and "going after the resources they need."

Carroll County and attended Westminster High School. He became a truck driver at the age of 18 and was the owner of C.L. Gross Trucking. Bud's family and friends worked diligently to organize the fundraising event to raise funds and increase suicide awareness, helping prevent future suicides.
